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Postgraduate Legal Fellowship

The Education Law Center-PA seeks to sponsor applicants for postgraduate legal fellowships in our Philadelphia and Pittsburgh offices to start in the Fall of 2025. Applicants should be law students graduating in the Spring of 2025 or current law clerks and have a demonstrated commitment to racial justice, public interest law, civil rights, and advancing the rights of underserved populations.

The Education Law Center is a civil rights legal organization which seeks to ensure access to a quality public education for all children in Pennsylvania. We pursue this mission through advocacy on behalf of underserved students—Black and brown children, children living in poverty, children in the foster care and juvenile justice systems, children with disabilities, multilingual learners and immigrant children, LGBTQ students, and children experiencing homelessness. ELC has three priority program areas which often intersect: ensuring equal access to school, advocating for fair school funding, and dismantling the School-to-Prison Pipeline.

ELC engages an array of strategies to fulfill our mission including policy advocacy, impact litigation, community engagement, and individual representation. Our work includes direct client contact, case development, formal representation in state and federal court, and advocacy with local school districts and state legislative and administrative bodies.

Scope and responsibilities of the fellowship will vary depending on the project and sponsor/funder priorities. Potential projects under consideration include:

- Challenge discriminatory school rules and exclusionary discipline that reinforce racism, ableism, and sexism
 (including virtual exclusion, expulsion, failure to provide due process, and failure to consider qualifying
 disabilities), through individual representation and systemic advocacy to promote restorative and non-punitive
 alternatives
- Challenge racist and ableist policies that deny young learners and school-age students with disabilities the
 individualized behavioral, academic, and socioemotional supports they need to engage in school in the least
 restrictive environment
- Dismantle the policies and practices that lead to push out of Black and brown families, including caregiver exclusion, discriminatory fines and fees, summary offenses, and criminalization through truancy referrals
- Reduce education barriers and promote effective and responsive models for students who need mental health and behavioral health supports in schools, with a focus on Black girls and LGBTQ-identified young people
- Oppose discriminatory school policies targeting gay and transgender students, book bans, classroom censorship
 and hostile school environments through direct representation, local and state advocacy, systemic reform, and
 community organizing support
- Promote equal access to a quality education for students in foster care and juvenile justice systems through representation and systemic advocacy
- Challenge discriminatory policies and practices and the failure of newly arrived immigrants and multilingual learners to receive effective language instruction as required by federal law

Qualified applicants should have a J.D., as well as: a commitment to racial and social justice; strong analytical, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills; and strong legal research and writing skills.

We will review applications on a rolling basis, and preference will be given to applications received by July 5, 2024.
